

# THE TROPHIES OF THE INTERNATIONAL 8-METRE CLASS

## The International Eight Metre World Cup

Yachts of all vintage start and race together during the World Championships. This poses a challenge to the scoring as the design of the yachts covers a period of more than 100 years and 3 consecutive rating rules. Although the International Rule provided room for naval architects to develop their ideas, the framework in which this could be done was and is tight meaning that the performance difference is small enough to provide interesting racing between yachts of the different design periods, yet it is too significant not to provide additional trophies for the different age groups. Following is an attempt to explain the background of the several trophies and their method of scoring during a World Championships.

## The groups of yachts competing are:

#### THE MODERN 8-METRES

These yachts have been designed and built after 1967 and their design often resembles successful America's Cup 12-Metres. Other than the restrictions specified in the Class Rules, the modern boats have no limits on materials for the hull, sails, spars and deck gear. Most of them are equipped with state of the art systems, similar to what can be found on the most advanced America's Cup yachts. The moderns race for the *World Cup* and the *Coppa d' Italia*.

#### THE CLASSIC 8-METRES

These yachts have been designed and built before 1967. Traditionally these yachts have raced for the Sira Cup but in recent years the development in the class lead to the introduction of further trophies. Following debates on changes to the underwater body of the yacht which could exclude yachts racing for the Sira Cup, the Royal Northern & Clyde Yacht Club has donated a trophy with more permissive rules. Traditionally the classic yachts have been following the latest trends in yacht gear such as kevlar sails and aluminium spars and modern deck gear. Since 1998 the vintage yachts appeared on the starting line with a very traditional and authentic approach. These yachts quality for the Neptune Trophy which is governed by a separate rule.



### THE FIRST RULE 8-METRES

The roots of the 8-Metre Class go back to when the International Rule and the IYRU where established. The First International Rule provided superb racing for the approximately 140 8-Metres built under that rule in the period between 1908 and 1919. Almost 100 years later a few of these beautiful classic yachts have survived and the IEMA applauds their participation in the official World Championships. The largest concentration of these yachts is found on Lake Constance in Germany and their association has made available the First Rule Cup.

Scoring:	The First Rule Cup is scored using the positions from the overall results in a separate point scoring system.
